Decorating with Pennsylvania Native Plants for the Holidays

Marc Radell, PennState Master Gardener Emeritus, Montgomery County, Dec. 2021 People of different cultures have been decorating their homes with colorful vegetation during the winter months for millennia, often to celebrate religious or secular holidays. Many plants native to Pennsylvania can provide beautiful, eco-friendly accents to your home this season. Please remember to gather plant material only with the permission of the property owner & to compost or responsibly dispose of it afterwards.

Live Trees. Potted evergreen conifers, such as White & Red Pines, Red & Black Spruces, Balsam Fir & Eastern Red Cedar, can be kept in a cool spot indoors for up to 10 days. A few days before bringing one inside, move it to an unheated garage or porch to help it adjust to higher temperatures. Remove any insects, egg masses, or other pests. Once indoors, place the pot in a saucer away from ducts, fireplaces, or other heat sources. While your tree is inside, water it regularly. After the holidays, return the tree to the unheated area for a few days & then plant it outdoors or store it in a sheltered location outside until spring.

Vines for Wreaths. Summer & Fox Grapes, Virginia & Trumpet Creepers, Coral Honeysuckle, Virgin's Bower & other native vines can be woven into wreaths. Soak lengths of vine in warm water for 1 hour to increase flexibility. Remove the vines from the water, coil one into a circle of the desired size, and weave its remaining length around the circle. Add new lengths of vine by tucking one end between the woven stems and wrapping them around the circle to attain the desired thickness. Let the wreath dry & tighten overnight before decorating. Secure greens and accents by tucking their stems between the woven vines or tying them with natural twine.

Evergreens for Wreaths, Garlands & Centerpieces. The branches of the evergreen conifers listed above are often plentiful & provide most of the greens for decorating. Use a variety of these greens or add branches of broadleaved evergreens and semi-evergreens, including Rosebay, Mountain Laurel, Inkberry & Sweetbay, for textural interest. When collecting greens, follow standard pruning practices and consider the plants' overall structure & health.

Berries, Cones & Other Accents. The fruits of Winterberry, American Holly, & Swamp & Virginia Roses provide a classic touch of red to holiday decorations. For more color, consider the blue 'berries' of Eastern Red Cedar, the gold berries of some Winterberry cultivars, or the orange fruit capsules of American Bittersweet. The cones of pines, spruces & firs add dimension and a sense of tradition. Red-Twig Dogwood stems bring vertical interest to centerpieces, as do the purplish stems of Black Raspberry. Don't be afraid to include other plant materials that catch your eye, such as the snowy floral bracts of Joe-Pye Weed, starry seed casings of Swamp Rosemallow, or vibrant leaves of native oaks & American Beech.
